Nillumbik Council is seeking feedback to assist them in developing their Council Plan 2025-2029, Health and Wellbeing Plan 2025-2029, and to help review the existing Community Vision – Nillumbik 2040 and the Financial Plan.

These are important, overarching documents that will help to lay the foundation for the Council's work over the next four years, and into the future.

Globally, representative democracy is falling seriously short of providing effective solutions for deep seated problems like the climate and biodiversity crisis. These systems are being gravely undermined by powerful lobby groups of vested interests and corporations, and their decisions are hampered by pervasive mis- and disinformation. In Australia, we need to rebuild democracy along the lines of a more community participatory model, an approach that has been effective elsewhere. 

6. The Americanisation of Australian Politics: Watching the Atlas Network

Although the following article was written in late 2023, the trend that it describes can be observed with increasing frequency in the current political climate leading up to the forthcoming federal elections, as well as worldwide. The need to call out the organisations that are responsible for the mis- and disinformation about the climate crisis is becoming ever more urgent, as the effects are in evidence in the climate and environment policies of both major parties.

'It is no accident that the Australian "conservative" movement has transformed into an echo of the toxic American Right. Fossil fuel money and a giant international network of junktanks bear much of the blame.

Dr Jeremy Walker's research into the Atlas Network's Australian partners brought that American body to prominence over the referendum campaign. The media coverage of his academic study into the <a href="influence of "think" tanks such as the Centre for Independent Studies (CIS) and the Institute of Public Affairs (IPA) carrying Atlas strategies into the Australian civic discourse raised Atlas's profile.

The latest attack by Atlas partner organisations, including (unofficially) News Corp, is a strategic campaign against offshore wind farms.

The model, as Walker reports, for the supposedly grassroots campaign against offshore wind farms on coastal NSW is derived from a <u>related campaign</u> in the United States. Researchers into climate disinformation at Brown University's IBES first noticed local groups springing up with high production value visual material and matching talking points. While some figures acting in local Facebook groups seem to be authentic (if misled), others seem suspiciously strategic in their interaction.'

9. Assessing the impact of a nuclear pathway on Australia's emissions

The <u>Climate Change Authority</u> has released a new media release which states: "New analysis shows pursuing the deployment of nuclear in Australia's grid could add at least 2 billion tonnes to national emissions, equivalent to 200 years of Australia's emissions from aviation."

'Delaying the overhaul of Australia's grid risks adding at least 2 billion tonnes of emissions

New analysis shows pursuing the deployment of nuclear in Australia's grid could add at least 2 billion tonnes to national emissions, on a global path that is consistent with 2.6°C of warming.

The Climate Change Authority has compared published modelling by the Australian Energy Market Operator and Frontier Economics to understand how a nuclear pathway could impact national efforts to reduce emissions.

The analysis finds that a nuclear pathway could see Australia miss the legislated 43% emissions reduction target for 2030 by five percentage points, and still not achieve this level of reduction by 2035.

Australia would not reach 82% zero emissions electricity until 2042 – more than a decade later than current national plans.'

10. A price on pollution

Yes, it's been tried before, but it really is a no-brainer - make the fossil fuel industry pay for the pollution they are responsible for creating. <u>Citizens' Climate Lobby</u> are promoting their new campaign - <u>priceourpollution.com.au</u> which argues for pollution pricing, not only as a means to reduce emissions but also as

- a human right
- a way to phase out fossil fuels
- a means to reduce dangerous levels of inequality
- a way to lower the cost of living for all but the wealthiest citizens
- a vital health measure.

The webpage includes a short video <u>Price Pollution - Pay People - Cool the Planet</u>. Sign the letter and put pressure on our government to reintroduce a price on pollution.

11. How climate change drives up Victoria's cost of living

Here is how climate change is increasing cost of living:


- Extreme weather events damage and reduce food from agriculture, which will push up food prices (ABC) See Farmers for Climate action 2022 report: Fork in the Road PDF
- Extreme weather events can disrupt transport of food and other items. For example, Bananas from north Queensland won't be able to get to market due to the North Queensland Floods washing away essential bridges, causing banana prices to rise. This can also disrupt delivery of other goods and services.
- Extreme weather damages are causing Insurance premiums to rise. Between 2022 and 2023, the average home insurance premium in Australia rose by 14%, the biggest rise in a decade. International climate disaster events like the <u>LA fires will impact the large re-insurance</u>

<u>companies</u>, which will put up their re-insurance rates to retail insurance companies. Of course, many people in bushfire or flood zones have already found they are now effectively uninsurable.

- Approving new coal and gas projects reduces labour availability to work in housing construction, making construction costs higher, exacerbating housing affordability and housing crisis. (Australia Institute)
- Energy prices have risen and are a major contributing factor to the cost of living crisis in all sectors of the economy. Reliance on coal and gas for electricity and energy with aging infrastructure has fuelled cost of living increases and inflation while renewables in the mediumlong term reduce energy prices. In 2023 energy cost increases were driven initially by temporary 'shock' increases in global coal and gas prices following Russia's invasion of Ukraine. CSIRO continues to show in the annual GenCost report that Firmed renewables are the cheapest energy source, and AEMC projects electricity price falls over the next decade with renewables and electrification.
